### II. Community/Government Reports & Announcements

1. Jenny Portillo, Field Representative for LA Councilmember Bob Blumenfield reported on: (1) the bike ride scheduled for February 19 has been postponed due to inclement weather. The new date is to be determined; (2) a meeting on LBGTQ issues was held at the Unitarian Church in Canoga Park; (3) the City is looking for grants to improve the section of Sherman Way between Canoga and Desoto Avenues. Projects may include the current Canoga Park BID, (4) ownership/responsibility for upkeep of the side of Bassett St. along the LA River is current being debated between LA City and LA County. The City is still attempting basic upkeep while this issue is being resolved; (5) LAMC 85.02 (people living in vehicles) designates specific non-residential streets where vehicles can be parked, subject to existing parking regulations. Ms. Portillo will bring a map with designated streets in Canoga Park to the next meeting. Angel Orellano commented that LAMC 85.02 "marginalizes" the lower income/homeless who live in vehicles. Don Evans asked about No Parking/Tow Away signage on Alabama Ave. between Elkwood and Strathern Streets (an industrial area). Ms. Portillo said that she would investigate.

#### III. General Public Comment on Non-Agenda Items:

- 1. Janis Risch from LA Public Library spoke on 2 programs: (1) a conversational English class at the Canoga Park Library every Friday from 4:00 5:00 pm, (2) a career certification/high school diploma program for adult is available at all Library locations. For details go to lapl.org and select the "Get a Diploma" link
- 2. Yolanda Aldaz from the DC Collective and the United Cannabis Business Association spoke in support of Measure M on the March 7, 2017 Ballot.
- 3. Alex Arce spoke on the need to clean up Bassett Street along the LA River and will request funds for this purpose. Has secured an estimate for \$4000 for weekly upkeep. CPNC Beautification Committee will work with Ms. Arce and Mr. Bluemfield's office on this issue.
- 4. Don Evans, Stakeholder Liaison to CPNC, attended 3 public meetings of interest: (1) A meeting with FilmLA on how to keep more filming in LA and how the public can comment on issues related to location shoots (parking, hours, etc.) FilmLA has a 24/7 contact number (213-977-8600. (2) A meeting on senior issues. Canoga Park has 1 of only 4 senior centers in the San Fernando Valley, and the possibility of new centers is limited, as there is a \$64 million backlog for maintenance in existing centers city-wide. (3) The Housing Our Workers Forum focused on people with "middle class" jobs could not afford to live in LA. Builders spoke of excessive regulations and fees (\$80-100K per single family dwelling) as barriers to building more affordable housing.
- Angel Orellana spoke on building a movement to empower people to "control their own destiny". Issues include: homelessness, lack of affordable housing, gentrification, upscale development, White supremacy, immigration, and the native heritage of Latinos transcending national borders.

PROCESS FOR RECONSIDERATION in accordance with Article VIII Meetings, Section 4 of the current CPNC By-Laws:

"The Board may reconsider and amend its action on items listed on the agenda if that reconsideration takes place immediately following the original action or at the next regular Neighborhood Council meeting. The Board, on either of these two (2) days, shall: (1) make a Motion to Reconsider and, if approved, (2) hear the matter and take an action. If the Motion to Reconsider an action is to be scheduled at the next meeting following the original action, then two items shall be placed on the agenda for that meeting: (1) a Motion to Reconsider the described matter and (2) a [Proposed] Action, should the Motion to Reconsider be approved. A motion for reconsideration can only be made by a Representative who has previously voted on the prevailing side of the original action taken. If a motion for reconsideration is not made on the date the action was taken, then a Representative on the prevailing side of the action must submit a memorandum to the Secretary identifying the matter to be reconsidered and a brief description of the reason(s) for requesting reconsideration at the next regular meeting. The aforesaid shall all be in compliance with the Brown Act."

PROCESS FOR FILING A GRIEVANCE in accordance with Article XI Grievance process of the current CPNC By-Laws:

- "A. Process. Any person or group adversely affected by the decisions or policy of the CPNC may file a written grievance with the Board. Within ten (10) working days, the Board shall then refer the matter to the grievance committee, who shall have ten (10) working days to meet with the person submitting the grievance and to discuss ways in which the matter may be resolved. The committee shall prepare a written report for the Board outlining their recommendations for resolving the grievance. The Board must then address the report at the next regular or special meeting.
- "B. Appeal. In the event that a grievance cannot be resolved through this grievance process, the matter may be referred to the Department for consideration or dispute resolution in accordance with the Plan.
- "C. Matters which can be grieved. The formal grievance process is not intended to apply to Stakeholders who simply disagree with a position or action taken by the Board at one of its meetings. Those grievances can be discussed at Board meetings. This grievance process is intended to address matters involving procedural disputes, e.g. the Board's failure to follow these bylaws or its Standing Rules."

#### BROWN ACT REVISION AND LANGUAGE IN THE BYLAWS

The City Attorney wishes to bring to your attention a recent amendment to the Brown Act\* that takes effect on July 1, 2008, and impacts the wording of board agendas and also impacts how the records, which are reviewed by board members in anticipation of a meeting, are to be made available to the public. This information is intended to provide you with guidance in preparing the agendas for the Neighborhood Councils.

The pertinent amendment is contained in Government Code section 54957.5 paragraph (b) reads as follows:

- "(b) (1) If a writing that is a public record under subdivision (a), and that relates to an agenda item for an open session of a regular meeting of the legislative body of a local agency, is distributed less than 72 hours prior to that meeting, the writing shall be made available for public inspection pursuant to paragraph (2) at the time the writing is distributed to all, or a majority of all, of the members of the body.
- (2) A local agency shall make any writing described in paragraph (1) available for public inspection at a public office or location that the agency shall designate for this purpose. Each local agency shall list the address of this office or location on the agendas for all meetings of the legislative body of that agency. The local agency also may post the writing on the local agency's Internet Web site in a position and manner that makes it clear that the writing relates to an agenda item for an upcoming meeting.
- (3) This subdivision shall become operative on July 1, 2008."

Typically, board members receive an agenda and written materials to review in advance of a meeting (the "agenda packet"). Government Code section 54957.5 clarifies that once the writings or agenda packet are delivered to a majority of the members on the board, the records, unless specifically protected from disclosure by the Public Records Act, must be made immediately available upon request. If written materials are submitted to the board after the posting of the agenda, then the agency shall designate a location (and an optional website link) where the public may view the records. Therefore, Neighborhood Councils should provide for easy access to the records by making them available on the website in addition to a physical location. It will be important to insure that upon distribution of the agenda packet to a majority or all of the board members, the documents are promptly placed in the correct location and posted on the
